A Message from our Pastor, Fr. Arnold Aurillo



Dear Parishioners,

I am still in my ten day quarantine while I am writing this. I am facing the Manila Bay from the 7th floor of my hotel room. While in transit, I already prepared myself for this unique situation brought about by the Philippine government's protocol. I told myself, "go with the flow and look for the positive side." When I arrived at the Manila International Airport, I saw immediately the unusual set up of going through immigration. I was just blessed to have a Coast Guard officer to escort me through the process. Things were expedited. Thanks to the Bishop of the Military Ordinariate who facilitated all this for me. He even provided me an SUV car to bring me to my hotel. Everything went so easy despite the abnormality of it all. I could not thank God enough for all the goodness He has shown me.

When I checked in at the front desk, I was immediately told that I would not be given a key to my room because I am not allowed to leave my room for the ten days. Everything is provided to me including my food. I tried asking for an exemption because I am already vaccinated. But I was told that there are cameras to monitor us those who are quarantining and if I don't comply I will not be released and I will be penalized.

Again, I need to go back to my philosophy for this trip "go with the flow". So, I just followed and upon entering my room which is facing the Manila Bay, I set up an altar by the window where I can celebrate Holy Mass everyday. I decided that my quarantine will be my spiritual retreat where I can have more personal prayer, reflection; I also avail of some good spiritual talks from YouTube and pod casts. Definitely, this is not a wasted time. In fact after five days being in quarantine, I realized that I am enjoying it. I am not mindful of the time. Every time, I celebrate the Mass, I am not constrained with the 30 minutes or an hour time. I just let it happen and enjoy the intimacy with the Lord. It is a celebration and adoration at the same time. What a beautiful isolation or imprisonment of sort.

I have realized this before and many times over but more so now that the greatest enjoyment in life is not our human activity alone but the activity we have with the Lord and for the Lord. I am more free and more connected now with the world in my isolation because I am connected with the Lord. Last Sunday's readings especially the Gospel, were a perfect message for me from God. We all need healing. We see people sick and dying. But we need to have the faith of Jairus or the woman in the gospel so that through that faith God will do His part to restore whatever that needs restoration.

Brothers and sisters, I am again reminding you to really find time to have a deep encounter with Jesus. His Word and the Sacrament are His concrete presence for us. The Holy Spirit is always there to facilitate that encounter. All we need is to fall prostrate or to touch him because we have the faith for Him. This is what the world needs now - for each person to go back to their innermost being and find God there. Humanity is sick because it alienates itself from God.

Let us all commit ourselves to pray harder and pray without ceasing.

Fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time July 4th, 2021

Ezekiel 2:2-5; 2 Corinthians 12:7-10; Mark 6:1-6

Jesus visits His hometown of Nazareth and finds that the villagers have a hard time believing that He is the Messiah. They know Him as the carpenter's son, as Mary's child, and all His kinfolk. It's very hard for them to imagine that person to now be standing here in front of them, calling Himself their Savior.

Put yourself in their place. Imagine a kid from your elementary school who you happen to see on TV running for president! What would you think? You know his or her background. You know his or her parents, siblings, education. Would you think that person was someone qualified to run this country? You probably would scoff at the idea! Well, that's what they did.

Jesus wasn't happy with them. They probably had heard about the miracles He had been performing around Galilee. He could have done the same thing in Nazareth, but they had no faith in Him. He healed a few people of their illnesses, but not to the extent that He could have.

A few weeks ago, Jesus talked about having faith the size of a mustard seed. A tiny mustard seed. And if you had the faith in the Lord the size of a mustard seed, you could move a mountain. The people of Nazareth didn't have that faith. Jesus didn't feel the need to prove to them by performing miracles, that He was the Messiah. He knew who He was.

Do you need miracles to believe in Him? What does it take for you to believe in Jesus? Have you thought about it? What is it about Jesus that lets you believe that He is the Messiah? Each Sunday we hear the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus' life. Is that what convinces you? Or do you read the Bible daily? Does that strengthen your believe in Jesus?

Was it being baptized, then confirmed? The cleansing water followed by the anointing oil? Do you know what it is that makes you believe in Jesus as your savior? Take some time this week to really discern what it is that brings you to Jesus.

We are all called to spread the word of the Messiah, but to do so, we need to know why we are doing it. Our love for Jesus is why He loves us. And we love Him. That's the deep reason why we believe. Think about it. Then feel it!

¿Por qué julio está dedicado a la Santísima Sangre de Cristo?



*Un Papa estableció esta fiesta cuando se vio
exiliado de Roma*

Una devoción particular en la Iglesia Católica relacionada con la **Pasión de Jesucristo** consiste en honrar su Preciosa Sangre. Es un reconocimiento del sacrificio de Jesús y de cómo derramó su sangre para la salvación de la humanidad. Además, esta sangre se hace presente a través del don de la Eucaristía y es algo que podemos consumir en la misa, junto con el cuerpo de Cristo, bajo la apariencia de pan y vino.

Con el tiempo, **la Iglesia desarrolló varias fiestas de la Preciosa Sangre**, pero no fue hasta el siglo XIX cuando se estableció una fiesta universal.

Durante la Primera Guerra Italiana por la Independencia en 1849, el Papa Pío IX se exilió a Gaeta. Fue allí con Don Giovanni Merlini, tercer superior general de los Padres de la Preciosa Sangre.

Mientras la guerra seguía en su apogeo, Merlini le sugirió al Papa Pío IX que creara una fiesta universal a la Preciosa Sangre para rogar a la ayuda celestial de Dios para que terminara la guerra y llevar la paz a Roma. Pío IX posteriormente hizo una declaración el 30 de junio de 1849 de que tenía la intención de crear una fiesta en honor de la Preciosa Sangre. La guerra pronto terminó y regresó a Roma poco después.

El 10 de agosto lo hizo oficial, y proclamó que **el primer domingo de julio se dedicará a la Preciosa Sangre de Jesucristo**. Más tarde, el Papa Pío X asignó el 1 de julio como la fecha fija de esta celebración.

Después del Concilio Vaticano II, la fiesta se eliminó del calendario, pero se estableció una Misa votiva en honor de la Preciosa Sangre que se puede celebrar en el mes de julio (como en la mayoría de los otros meses del año).

Por estas razones, todo el mes de julio se dedica tradicionalmente a **la Preciosa Sangre**, y se alienta a los católicos a meditar en el sacrificio profundo de Jesús y el derramamiento de su sangre por la humanidad.

A continuación se muestra la oración de apertura de la Misa votiva, así como una oración adicional que puede usarse como nuestra propia meditación u oración personal durante el mes de julio. →

Oh Dios, que por la Preciosa Sangre de tu Unigénito has redimido al mundo entero, conserva en nosotros la obra de tu misericordia para que, honrando siempre el misterio de nuestra salvación, merecer la obtención de sus frutos. Por nuestro señor Jesucristo, tu Hijo vive y reina contigo en la unidad del Espíritu Santo, por los siglos de los siglos. Admitido a tu mesa sagrada, oh Señor, hemos sacado con alegría el agua de las fuentes del Salvador: Oh, sangre, te suplicamos, te conviertas en una fuente de agua que brota de la vida eterna. AMEN

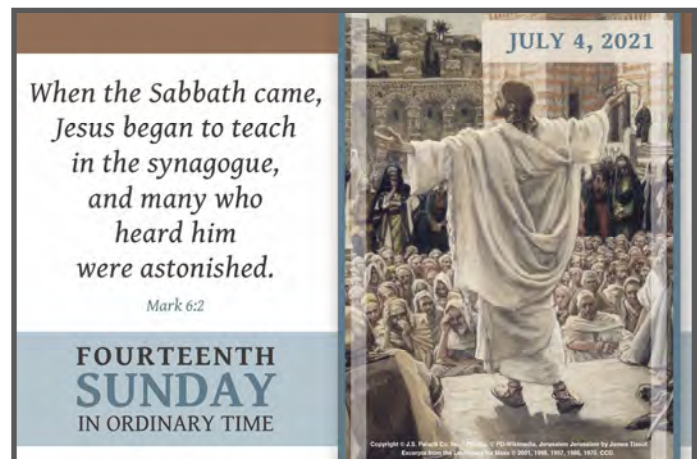

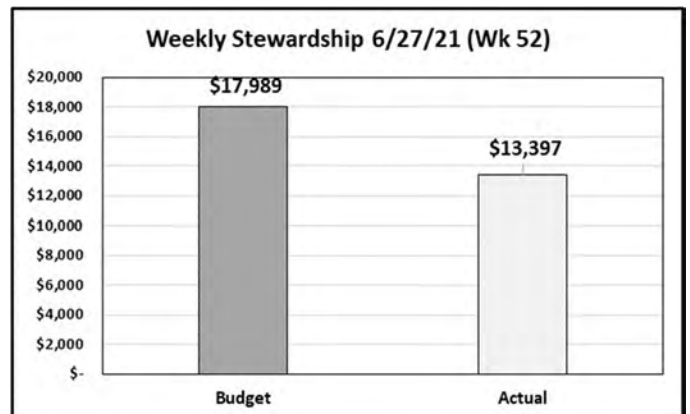
