Pastor's Corner

Reflection: I would like to highlight one important action in the gospel reading we have today when Jesus said, “Come have breakfast.” And He came over and took the bread and gave it to them and in like manner the fish. For sure this breakfast meal must have reminded them of many meals they shared with Him – the meal on the mountain side after the multiplication of loaves, the meal at the house of Matthew with all those tax collectors, the Passover meals and of course, that last supper when Jesus put a messianic significance into it. Now, here they were, after the resurrection enjoying another meal with the Risen Jesus and they were all reminded of everything about Jesus. This is for them the best chance to renew their friendship and union with Jesus.

This is exactly who we are every time we participate in the Holy Eucharist. It reminds us of many Masses in our life: our first Holy Communion, Confirmation, Wedding, Christmas and Easter Masses, Special Masses during birthdays and anniversaries and funeral masses we attended. Here, the Lord Jesus comes to us to teach us and brings us together around the altar as He offers His very self to us again. We need the constant renewal that the Eucharist gives us. We need the Eucharistic meal to renew our commitment to be His disciples, to maintain our closeness with him and to remind us of our identity because so much in our life pulls us away from Him.

This is what Jesus did for His Apostles at the seashore. And this is what He does for us at every Mass.

Priests' Convocation: Last Monday and Tuesday, April 25 -26, 2022 were days of camaraderie and updates for all priests of the Diocese of Tucson. After two years of not being able to gather as a presbyterium, finally last Monday and Tuesday, we gathered in person and enjoyed listening to our excellent-inspiring speaker **Fr. Ron Rolheiser, OMI**, a professor, theologian, and an award-winning author who shared with us Spirituality and Ministry. He reminded all of us that ministering always takes place within a concrete “existential” situation; that we must be able to recognize what is happening at the moment (read the signs of times) and recognize our role in it. He said in his opening statement that “we are a bitterly divided society and divided church wherein the sincere are separated from the sincere – and we all find it hard to listen.” This division according to him, is being fueled by a number of things in which he outlined seven things. But of the seven my attention was more drawn into these two factors, namely, 1) that personal narratives are taken as truth and social media keep providing a constant stream of disinformation so much so that there is now a loss of a sense of Truth; 2) that we struggle with the diabolical and the satanic, fueled by the prince of lies. All of this he said, is working to bring out the worst in us.

So, he invited us priests to “Ponder” as Mary Pondered - to hold, carry and transform tension so as not to give it back, knowing that whatever we don't transform we will transmit. He challenged all the priests to “make a vow of love and to take Jesus seriously about loving those who hate us.” He finished his talk exhorting us to be always a “BLESSING” to others, that means, we must speak well of others, admire them, delight in them, appreciate them and be willing to give our life so that they may have life.

First Communion: I would like to congratulate our **Religious Education first communicants**. Twenty of them last Saturday (April 30) came to receive for the first time the Eucharistic Jesus. I must congratulate their parents and all family members as well for the commitment and support you have given to all your children. Kudos to the Religious Education team headed by Laura Stehle for the sacrifices you have given to prepare these children for this big sacramental event. Our children are not the future of the Church, they are the Church now, so, let us commit to bring them to church especially every Sunday.

Mary's Devotion: May is Mary's month. This is also the peak of the season of Spring – the season of flowers. Mary is the “Perfect Flower!” So, we dedicate this month to offer flowers to Mary through praying the Holy Rosary. I am also inviting you that on May 7th as a parish we will have Mass in honor of Mother Mary at 8:30am and afterwards, we will have a procession outside the church while praying the rosary; then, come back to the church to do the crowning of our Queen - Mother Mary!



Lastly, I am reminding you of our Annual Catholic Appeal commitment. The Diocese is asking all of us to send our contribution or pledges by May 31st. At this point we have only reached 59% of our goal of \$163,340. Please let us be generous as you always have been to help us reach our goal! Fire of Love

Scott Hahn reflects on the Third Sunday of Easter

*Acts 5:27-32; Psalm 30:2, 4-6, 11-13;
 Revelation 5:11-14; John 21:1-19*

There are two places in Scripture where the curious detail of a ‘charcoal fire’ are mentioned.

One is in today’s Gospel, where the Apostles return from fishing to find bread and fish warming on the fire. The other is in the scene in the High Priest’s courtyard on Holy Thursday, where Peter and some guards and slaves warm themselves while Jesus is being interrogated inside (*see John 18:18*).

At the first fire, Peter denied knowing Jesus three times, as Jesus had predicted (*see John 13:38, 18:15-18, 25-27*).

Today’s charcoal fire becomes the scene of Peter’s repentance, as three times Jesus asks him to make a profession of love. Jesus’ thrice repeated command “feed My sheep” shows that Peter is being appointed as the shepherd of the Lord’s entire flock, the head of His Church (*see also Luke 22:32*).

Jesus’ question: “do you love me more than these?” is a pointed reminder of Peter’s pledge to lay down his life for Jesus, even if the other Apostles might weaken. (*see John 13:17; Matthew 26:33; Luke 22:33*).

Jesus then explains just what Peter’s love and leadership will require, foretelling Peter’s death by crucifixion (“you will stretch out your hands”).

Before His own death, Jesus had warned the Apostles that they would be hated as He was hated, that they would suffer as He suffered (*see Matthew 10:16-19, 22; John 15:18-20; 16:2*).

We see the beginning s of that persecution in today’s First reading. Flogged as Jesus was, the Apostles nonetheless leave “rejoicing that they have been found worth to suffer.”

Their joy is based on their faith that God will change their “mourning into dancing,” as we sing in today’s Psalm. By their suffering, they know, they will be counted worthy to stand in heaven before “the Lamb that was slain,” a scene glimpsed in today’s Second reading (*see also Revelation 6:9-11*).

Gospel: Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." John 21:1-19

Laudato Si': We are agreed today that the earth is essentially a shared inheritance, whose fruits are meant to benefit every-one. For believers, this becomes a question of fidelity to the Creator, since God created the world for everyone. Hence every ecological approach needs to incorporate a social perspective which takes into account the fundamental rights of the poor and the underprivileged. (LS,93)

Reflection: God's provision abounds in and for all creation. Everything is provided in the evolutionary journeying of our common home and the flourishing of life. Cattle have grass to eat; seagulls have fishes to eat; bees have nectars to produce honey; humans have food to eat. However, there is now a point to worry. Our aggressive assault on the natural world is disrupting the integrity of the Earth's biological processes and functioning that support the whole community of life, and it is also compromising God's provision for all creatures. It should worry us when the Earth's resources are indiscriminately plundered and used up beyond the renewal rate and limits of the earth's biological processes, benefitting only a select few.

Easter Season Eco-Action: There are reasons to be alarmed when mountains are stripped of trees so mineral resources can be extracted; fishermen use illegal means to fish; when we continue to pollute the waters, the soil and the air; and, when ordinary people lose the natural resources from which they depend for living. If we work together to protect our resources there will continue to be clean water and fish for those who depend on them for living. Be involved in the protection and care of the natural world and the education of peoples about the natural world.

Prayer: *Praise to you, Lord, God of all creation For through your goodness, you bless all creatures with your bountiful provision. Help us to be mindful not only of our physical-material needs but also of the needs of our fellow creatures. Amen.*

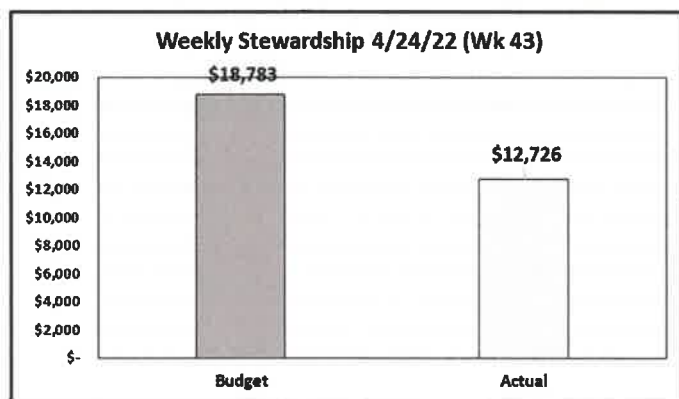
