From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

A Blessed Easter to everyone!

This Sunday is a Mercy Sunday. The gospel we have today recounts the appearance of the risen Jesus to his Apostles. They saw the Lord. He stood in their midst, showed them His hands and sides. They heard His blessing, “Peace be with you.” Then, they received His commission — “As the Father has sent me, so I send you.” The commission is to extend the MERCY of God to all peoples through the power and Spirit He conferred upon them.

Brothers and sisters, we are all God’s disciples through our baptism. We belong to his family – His Body, the Church. Cardinal Walter Kasper wrote that *“the church defined itself in the Second Vatican Council as a sacrament—a universal sign and instrument of God’s salvation through Jesus Christ. If the church is a sacrament of God’s love in Christ, it is also a sacrament of God’s mercy. Therefore, the command for the church to be merciful is grounded in the identity of the church as the body of Christ. The church is not a kind of social or charitable agency; as the body of Christ, it is the sacrament of the continuing effective presence of Christ in the world. It is the sacrament of mercy as the “total Christ”—that is, Christ in head and members. Thus, the church encounters Christ himself in its own members and in people who are in need of help.”*

This is who we are as OMOS family! We have our calling to be God’s vessels of Mercy. The world we live in now is so wounded and bruised because of greed, injustice, power control, dysfunctional family and society, lies and fake news, too much partisan politics, and worst of all – the PANDEMIC of COVID-19 that we all are surmounting now. More than ever in our history as a people, we need all the MERCY and LOVE from this Victorious God. But God needs each of us who received him in faith to be his disciples of Mercy. This is the peak time, that we need to listen to the inner voice of God within us summoning us to respond to this unprecedented situation, to be able to make a big difference in our life and the life of others.

Jesus in his Beatitudes says, *“Blessed are the merciful.”* The risen Lord would like us to be his dispensers of mercy. When things get back to normal, we must have the resolve to fulfill this commission to be vessels of mercy and love. We are to meet our brothers and sisters with care and respond. The examples of Jesus are always there for us to follow. He cures the blind, feeds the hungry, heals the sick, comforts the sorrowful, seeks those who are lost, forgives sinners, and restores them back to life. Above all, he said, “there is no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends.” The ultimate act of MERCY is dying to oneself in order to bring life to the other.

I have seen countless people who are doing this heroic act. With the COVID-19 virus escalating, I am just eternally grateful for all our “FRONT LINE” responders. They risk their lives to take care of COVID patients. In our community, I have seen so many of our parishioners praying in front of the Blessed Eucharist regularly. Others do fasting and abstinence asking God to stop this pandemic. I also have witnessed parishioners heeding the call to bring food and groceries for the St. Vincent de Paul ministry. I was, and am very much pleased to see parishioners sending their stewardship contribution so that the parish can continue to operate. I am grateful for my parish staff, all Deacons and some parishioners who are helping me in reaching out to our parishioners, calling them, checking on them, sending them e-mails and assuring them that nothing can destroy our being one Church because we remain united in our faith.

We your priests, continue to serve all of you in our daily prayer and most especially in our daily celebration of the Holy Eucharist and Sunday celebration through livestreaming. We continue imparting God’s forgiveness through the sacrament of reconciliation for individuals who set an appointment. These are few acts of love that I am so grateful for. May this situation that we are in now, teach us to live our life more meaningfully. I am hoping that when everything is back to normal, we become more loving and caring for one another. We will all live the mandate of being disciples of Mercy and Love. And through our faith in Jesus, we become ready to say, *“YES, HERE I AM LORD, SEND ME!”*

A MESSAGE FROM FR. TOM

A blessed second Sunday of Easter to you all! This weekend the Church celebrates Divine Mercy Sunday, a feast which was established by Pope St. John Paul II in the year 2000. You may have heard of a Catholic devotion connected with today's celebration which he widely promoted: the Divine Mercy Chaplet. It takes about 8 minutes to pray from start to finish, and you can easily find instructions for it online. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is a simple devotion in which, through the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross, we ask God to be merciful to those who need it most. Maybe you know someone who is struggling with sin who would benefit from this prayer. Maybe this devotion will help you to forgive someone, just as it has helped me.

It takes time to forgive. It's not easy. Otherwise, we wouldn't need God's grace to do it. But by the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we all receive God's mercy and forgiveness. This is our path to peace and joy in this life, and in the life to come. Let's pay forward this sublime gift. Let's follow the example of Jesus, and be merciful as our heavenly Father is merciful. Brothers and sisters, showing mercy is the most divine thing we human beings can do. When we forgive another person, we become a conduit of God's grace. When we forgive one who has hurt us or someone we love, we become most like our loving God. Remember the words of Jesus from the Cross, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." Remember also the first words of the Risen Christ to the disciples who had turned their backs on him, "Peace be with you." May the infinite mercy of God bring to all of us his peace this Easter season.

Scripture Reflection

Divine Mercy Sunday
April 19, 2020

Acts 2:42-47; 1 Peter 1:3-9; John 20:19-31

“Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.”

Jesus says this to Thomas, after he has demanded to see the wounds in His hands and side. Thomas then believes that this man is truly the risen Lord Jesus. The other ten Apostles and Mary Magdalene had seen Jesus a week earlier. Thomas hadn't believed them when they told him.

The Apostles were still in hiding from the Jews. When Jesus came, He breathed the Holy Spirit onto them. But it would take several more weeks before they would feel safe to leave their hiding place. That would come at Pentecost.

That was similar to what we're living through now. We still have several weeks, at least, of social distancing and isolation to protect ourselves and each other. The Apostles spent the time praying and discussing what Jesus had taught them. We should do this as well. They didn't have the Bible, but we do. Now is the perfect time to read the Word of God. We can learn so much about Jesus from the Gospels. The Acts of the Apostles tells about what they did at the beginning of the church.

When Jesus told Thomas that “blessed are those who have not seen and have believed,” He was talking to us. We haven't seen Him, but we believe because of what is written about Him. Because of what they saw, they believed. We read and we believe.

Of course, not everyone is a reader. There are lots of movies out there about the life of Jesus. “Jesus of Nazareth” is very popular, as is “The Passion of the Christ.” “The Greatest Story Ever Told” is another. Just make sure that it is truly based on the Bible. “Jesus Christ Superstar” isn't biblically based so it might not be the best choice for learning about Jesus, but for entertainment purposes, it's fun.

This Sunday is Divine Mercy Sunday. Normally, we'd pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet before Mass, but this isn't a normal Sunday. In 2002, Pope Saint John Paul II instituted the second Sunday of Easter as a feast day. So sometime today, pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet. If you don't know how, you can do so using a Rosary. Here are the instructions:



GET REAL!

Those of us who flatter ourselves that we have a “realistic” view of the world may listen to the first reading today and say, “Get real!” when we hear Luke’s account of the early, Elysian days of the Christian movement. All seems to be rosy, lots of wonders are performed, everyone shares selflessly, they eat together in “exultation,” and the Lord added to their numbers? Well, who wouldn’t be attracted to a group like this? From the wind that swept through the upper room at Pentecost as the Spirit of God blew over the face of the waters in Genesis, and the fire that appeared over each disciple as the light appeared at the dawn of creation, Luke’s intent in Acts is to show a new creation, a restoration of creation’s original goodness through the working of the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit who continues to make us into the Body of Christ. We may occasionally, like Thomas in the Gospel, say, “Get real!” but our ultimate reality in the Spirit is to work continually to make our Christian community a new creation, one in which others will find God’s joy and beauty.
